

CCITC NOTICE: SPAM FILTERING

IronPort Spam Filtering

A few weeks ago CCITC upgraded our email SPAM filtering solution. The new solution includes the ability for users (You) to individually manage certain quarantined emails. The new system is still blocking messages that are clearly SPAM. In fact, over 90% of all incoming mail is SPAM. Some messages are less obvious and held in a 30 day (interim) location. You now receive weekly notifications (example below) of the most recent blocked items.

As noted in the message that you will receive, no action needs to be taken and messages are automatically removed after 30 days. MULTI-FUNCTION PRINTER SUPPLIES What Do I Do With the Empty Toner and Waste Cartridges?

This has been a frequent question lately. If you have a multi-function printer in your area and it has a full Waste Toner Cartridge, DO NOT THROW IT AWAY! The used Waste Toner Cartridge can be placed in a plastic bag and Marco Copiers can be contacted to come and empty cartridge. The empty cartridge is your replacement. These cartridges are not recyclable, disposable and are meant to use over and over. For regular empty Toner Cartridges, you can continue to recycle those by placing them in the box from the new cartridge and follow the recycling instructions. Questions? What is Chronic Health Condition Support at the Employee Health and Wellness Center?

Our team at the Employee Health and Wellness Center will work together with your primary care provider in collaboration to ensure that you receive the highest quality care possible.

Sherry Gatewood

The Employee Health and Wellness Center is able to support chronic health conditions such as hypertension, diabetes, and thyroid disorders. With these conditions, collaboration with your Primary Care Provider (PCP) or family doctor is crucial. Care can be provided to ensure your condition is well managed, and if needed adjustments can be made. Through the use of an integrated health medical record, communication will be sent to your Aspirus Primary Care Provider (PCP) regarding the care you receive at the Onsite clinic related to chronic health conditions. If the PCP has any questions or recommendations, you will be notified. If you do not have a PCP, our team at the Employee Health and Wellness Center will help find one that meets your needs.

Examples of chronic health condition support may include refilling medications as needed and ensuring appropriate lab tests are performed. For instance, if you need a refill of diabetes medication and your labs are up to date, the Provider at the Employee Health and Wellness Center will write the prescription. If you need a refill and your labs are not up to date, you will get a short refill as well as lab orders to satisfy the next refill. If your labs are abnormal, adjustments will be made to your medications and your PCP will be updated on any changes.

The Employee Health and Wellness Center will also work to coordinate care with any other specialist that is involved with your care. This will also be done in conjunction with your PCP.
